Recommended Township Tree Planting List 2024

The West Windsor Township Shade Tree Commission (STC) has prepared the following list with the advice of the Township's licensed NJ tree experts, past and present, and available source literature, such as <u>Dirr's Hardy Trees and Shrubs: An Illustrated Encyclopedia</u>. The STC strongly recommends planting native trees due to their adaptation to the local environment and the support they provide to other species that rely on them. There are included some non-native species that are not invasive for consideration. Both common and scientific (Genus species) names are provided for reference.

Always consider light, soil and moisture conditions when selecting plant materials for the best chance of success.

Shade Trees - Deciduous
